### From the Pastor's Pen

When I close my eyes in prayer and allow myself the possibility of looking within, to consider the wonder of God's magnificent all-encompassing love, the darkness I experience is beautiful and inviting. It is a space of deep healing.

In summer months, I volunteer for a program that I loved deeply as a teen and still love today for the power of transformation it serves as a catalyst of in people who dare to say yes to a week on top of a mountain in northern NH. My part is to lead an offsite week-long trip of canoeing and camping on Lake Umbagog (no running water, no bathrooms, no Coleman stove, and fully embracing leave-no-trace practices). Our last night together (back on the mountain) is always spent engaging in a camp tradition off the ages—sleeping on a ledge with no shelter, no fire and a night hike to our destination (no lights). Our conversation focuses on the power of the brain and the wonder of the human eye as the two work together to allow us to see in the dark. We talk of how, even in our sleep, our brains are aware of the space we sleep on and keep us from harm (yes, we have adults awake at all hours to ensure physical safety). We learn to embrace, through this experience, the beauty of darkness as without it, we cannot know light.

Common interpretation of scripture focusing on God's light has led to the belief that light is the source of goodness and hope. This belief implies darkness is not wanted or needed, it is something to banish or get rid of, as well, an extreme belief that God is not even present in the dark. We inherit too, Colonial interpretations of scripture that equated light and dark with the color of skin, leading to a similar dichotomy of thinking that those with light skin are chosen and those with dark skin are full of sin and deserving punishment. Both established negative views of human realities that cannot be changed and are deserving of love. God's love is radical, it is a power beyond our understanding. No one and nothing is separate from it. God created all, looked upon it, and called it good. Human reality and creation brings us our darkest moments. These moments are not given us by God, but are created by series of decision making by ourselves and others, impacting the trajectory of our lives. God's love. God is present in what sustains us through the hardness. God is responding as our minds shift towards healing. God is acting when others reach in to pull us out of ourselves and help us find clarity of mind. God is that force that stops us from going to the extremes of harm. God is the deep learning of ourselves that emerges when we lean into the darkness and ultimately saves us again and again.

Barbara Brown Taylor's book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, helps us reimagine our understanding of darkness, primarily how Christianity heavily relies on the binary construct of light as good and darkness as bad. Taylor proposes the pair of light and dark exist together in balance, not opposition. She asks, "What can light possibly mean without dark?" Taylor also challenges us to seek a new understanding of those experiences that we call our "darkest" as inherent to human experience and necessary for our survival.



# CHRISTIAN OUTREACH

The Christian Outreach Committee is beginning to think about the holiday season and the mittens in past years we have hung on The Giving Tree in the Narthex. There will be no tree this year as you enter the church, but that doesn't take away the feelings we have for giving to others. This year we have decided to again support the Residential reunification homes run by Community Healthlink whom we worked with last year.

These three homes, two in Worcester and one in Leominster, are residential treatment programs that provide a safe, supportive recovery community and promotes a sense of empowerment, family healing, and life skills essential for women and their children to stabilize and lead drug free, productive lives. These programs support and strengthen the family unit and provide these moms with the support they need to become effective, self-reliant caretakers for their children. These Christmas presents will bring joy to a group of children who otherwise may not get to enjoy a "normal" Christmas morning.

We know that the actual shopping for the items that are on the children's wish list may be tricky again this year and we want to be respectful of individuals who may also be trying to stay out of the stores. To that end the Outreach Committee has put together a registry on Amazon and as a congregation we will try to meet the children's wish list. All the individual gifts are on there along with the option to buy a \$10 gift card – the proceeds of which will be used to fund the remaining items from the wish list. # Pastor Stacey is a Clergy Coach (...though not yet certified)

When our congregation signed a covenant with Pastor Stacey for her leadership during this transitional period, we celebrated her receipt of a grant through the Lilly Foundation and the efforts of the Southern New England Conference to be trained as a clergy coach. Just before Thanksgiving she completed the first level of her training and next week will finish her Mentor Coaching and will have achieved the status of Associate Coach. She will be moving on to the second level of the training one day/week in the Spring. Pastor Stacey is choosing to seek certification once she has completed the Profession Level Training. By the end of this she will be licensed to coach individuals, organizations, business executives, and more. In order to arrive at the point of certification, Pastor Stacey is required to provide 500 coaching hours in the settings she serves. This allows Pastor Stacey to offer a unique service to the individual members of our congregation and to our congregation as a whole.

Coaching is applicable in all aspects of our lives—grief; vocational changes; moving through conflict with family or friends or community; making significant changes in our lives; finding the strength within to move through difficult moments; seeking to build more joy; finding self-confidence; navigating health concerns— the key is that the coachee is in a position of being ready to engage in the work of an architect, of designing what the future is going to look like. Coaching is not Pastoral Care in the traditional sense. Pastoral Care through the ages is similar to that of a "talk" therapist, taking the participant deeper into the why of the concerns they are presenting with a goal of assisting in the seeing of God and Christ to carry the participant through the hardship/healing/exploration. Coaching recognizes in each individual that there is already incredible resilience, skill, and vision for the present day and future life they will lead. Coaching seeks to tap into the knowledge and already present experience of the coachee to grow themselves. A coach approach to Pastoral Care is one that embraces the participant as whole and fully capable of achieving their dreams and greatest potential. It is a process of listening and asking questions to help the participant or coachee identify for themselves the change they desire, their next steps towards achieving their goals, key self-learnings and takeaways, and to make connections to healing work they've already done in their lives.

Our congregation is invited to reach out to Pastor Stacey and explore aspects of our lives that we might address through coaching with her. The number of sessions will vary from person to person and Pastor Stacey will work with you to understand what it might look like to be in a coaching relationship with her. She invites us, any time we approach her for pastoral care, to name what we need most from our time with her. She will be ready to pivot from traditional Pastoral Care into Coaching in any conversation with us. She will also be ready to ask us if we might be open to a coach approach in our conversations when she perceives it might be useful to us. As well, there may be times, when in meetings with her that she announces she is "donning her coach hat" and removing the one she wears as an Interim Minister. We may even find, as she lives into this new aspect of her vocational calling, that her sermons shift in delivery method.
